Let's get Hill Farm Reading!




On Wednesday the children who had been reading lots at home and were able to reach Madagascar on their reading passport were invited

Headlines from Year 6 Life as Head Boy & Head Girl

Interview with Esther 6SE Pupil



We are currently reading 'Holes' by Louis Sacher in our Reading Lessons. Miss Edwards interviewed Esther to find out more the book.

1. What is the book Holes about?

The book is about a boy called Stanley that is sent to a juvenile detention centre called Camp Green Lake, but the funny thing is, it's not green and it doesn't have

a lake! He's told that he's digging holes to build character but I think they're there to dig holes as a punishment... I think they're looking for something for their evil master, the Warden.

2. Are you enjoying it?

I'm really enjoying the book because of the characters and how interesting they are. There's a lot of mystery surrounding the story and it makes you want to read on to find out the answers!

3. What do you think is going to happen at the end of the book?

I think that the boys are going to find out more about who the Warden really is and what her reason is for being so cruel. I think she might be a relative of Kissing Kate Barlow - an outlaw that robbed Stanley's grandfather!

4. How does the book help you with your writing?

We have written lots of pieces of writing based around our book including a diary entry, a letter and a persuasive leaflet. We're currently writing a speech to persuade the other campmates to rebel against the Warden. We know so much about the characters now that it's easier to persuade them!
