
PARENTS EVENINGS

Some key messages from the briefings:

- The KS2 SATs Tests will take place on the week commencing Monday 9th May
- We are developing video content which will be available over the Easter break to support you and your children as they revise for the tests
- Your child/children shouldn't be worried about the tests; they are an opportunity for them to show off how much they know and celebrate how hard they have worked this year
- The single most important thing you can do to support your child at home is to read, read, read and read! The more language and vocabulary, sentence structures and story lines your child encounters, the easier they will find the reading test, the grammar test, writing and the understanding of the Maths reasoning questions.

We are so very proud of the children in Year 6 and how hard they are working - well done and keep it up!


PARKING
